Chapter 4

In the first three chapters Mark has emphasized the works of Jesus, and recorded very few of Jesus' teachings. We see a change in this chapter, as Mark now draws our attention to the teachings of Jesus. Keep in mind the increasingly fierce opposition that Jesus has faced from the Jewish leaders. This opposition led him to withdraw from the synagogues to the Sea of Galilee (3:7). As we see from this chapter, it also led him to speak to the people in parables.
